A Good Neighbor - A Found Treasure -Chinese proverb

t's not often that your neighbor becomes your surgeon. John Hospodar feels fortunate to have had Dr. Lynn McGrath, Deborah's Vice President of Medical Affairs and Chair of Cardiothoracic Surgery, as both. For 19 years, John and Rita Hospodar lived across the street from Dr. McGrath and his family in a South Jersey suburb. In fact, Rita recalls many fond memories of babysitting for the McGrath children.

During these years, the Hospodars were fortunate not to need the medical services of Deborah. However, through conversations with Dr. McGrath and friends who were Deborah patients, they recognized the vital need for our specialty medical facility. They began making annual donations to Deborah Hospital Foundation, to help those seeking lifesaving care.

As a retired VP Comptroller for Campbell's Soup Company International Operation, John clearly understands the effects of inevitable increased costs for a successful food manufacturer, as well as for a highly respected hospital. Therefore,



after a few years of annual donations, he and Rita decided to increase their support,

for which Deborah was grateful.

In 2005 the McGrath family moved to another part of town, several miles away from the Hospodars. Although John lost wonderful neighbors, he unexpectedly gained an exceptional surgeon a few years later, when Deborah's physicians discovered that he needed an aortic valve replacement and bypass surgery. In November of 2010, Dr. McGrath performed a successful open heart surgery.

Today, John and Rita are grateful to Dr. McGrath – for his friendship as a neighbor, and his technical skill as a surgeon. Just this past year, they increased their financial support again, knowing that there are countless others who can benefit from Deborah's highly skilled physicians.

"This Place Is Fantastic!"

his story's headline says it all — words from patient Scott Webring, who never suspected that he would be a patient at Deborah. A long-time former vegetarian who keeps himself in top physical shape with regular workouts, he was just getting off the elliptical machine at the Ft. Dix gym.

"I had no chest pain, no shortness of breath," he recalls. But, while walking to the stretch machine, he blacked out.

"After blacking out, I don't remember a thing until the ambulance ride, and it was only a few seconds, while I was having CPR performed on me! I remember a few seconds in the ER and the cath lab, but didn't really start coming around for real until I was in the medical intensive care unit."

A stay-at-home dad with five-year-old twin daughters, he had recently relocated here from Colorado with his active-duty wife who was stationed here. For Webring, the stakes related to good health are high.

A quick transfer to Deborah and Scott learned he had 90 percent blockages in two arteries. He needed stents.

Webring who was soon to receive Deborah's life-saving care, learned that he was the perfect candidate to be enrolled in one of the hospital's new clinical trials: EVOLVE II. The trial is studying a drug-eluting stent which uses the drug Everolimus, released by an ultrathin bioabsorbable polymer coating. Both the drug and the coating are completely

absorbed by the body within three months.

This is a change from the medicated stents currently used with durable polymer coatings that persist, mandating the use of dual anti-platelet therapy medications indefinitely, or for

at least one year until the stent is covered by the patient's own arterial lining. The new technology allows the advantage of treatment with medicated stents while eliminating the disadvantage of longer duration of anti-platelet therapy.

"I was given all the information about the study," he says, "and my wife and I looked at the available data. It was very favorable about enrolling in this trial." During Scott's initial hospitalization he received a stent through the groin, and three weeks later came back to Deborah for another one through the wrist. Like all of Deborah's randomized clinical trial patients, Scott does not know if he received the new stent or the traditional one. He won't find out until the trial is over.

Jon George, M.D., Deborah's Medical Director of Clinical Research says he relies on patients like Scott.

"Most people understand that for a cutting-edge hospital like Deborah to



pursue advanced treatments we have to forge forward with research. Mr. Webring, like our other clinical trial patients, recognizes that Deborah has a very careful and thorough process for reviewing clinical trials, and we take every possible precaution to maximize patient safety. Patients also realize that by participating in these trials they are potentially receiving the medicine of tomorrow that is available here today."

Webring, who grew up in Colorado Springs, was not familiar with Deborah before his visit earlier this summer, but has since become one of its biggest fans.

"The treatment and care I received while I was here were fantastic. I have never seen such a place where everyone is so accommodating. This place is fantastic."

In 2006, Sandy started having chest pain, and her insurance company at the time would not pay for the necessary testing required for an Ann Marie Klics


accurate diagnosis. Sandy paid for the testing out of her own pocket. The report

or me, it's all about being able to truly help someone. I really take pride in our hospital, and doing something positive for people and their health."

They took excellent care of him and he lived another decade of good quality life. Then my father had the classic indicators of a heart problem,

shortness of breath, dizziness, fatigue, sweats and nausea. The hospital he went to told him he had 'anxiety'. So, I brought him to Deborah and we learned he had coronary artery disease and underwent coronary stenting. Every experience my family has had with Deborah has been so positive and life-saving."


"I'm the **Luckiest Man** Alive"

ifty-eight-year-old Ed Buckley, of Barnegat, thanks his lucky stars. On March 19 all the dominoes were in place and fell the right way, and he is here, walking and talking with his friends and family, today because of this.

The lifelong volunteer firefighter and Ex-Chief was driving the truck as the squad responded to a call. He had just set the emergency brake and told the crew to check out the situation. "That was the last thing I remembered that day," he says.

When his fellow firefighters realized he had lost consciousness and wasn't breathing, they went into action.

The first domino that fell into place was that Buckley had driven the truck with a defibrillator - not all the trucks are outfitted with one. The second domino that fell into place was the quick response by the fire fighters to bring him back to life. The third domino was the on-site Barnegat EMS response. The



fourth domino was Southern Ocean Medical Center's quick stabilization of Buckley and use of the Arctic Sun Blanket for protective hypothermia. The final, critical, domino was transfer to Deborah, where he remained unconscious for 12 days, under expert medical treatment.

Once awake, Buckley received an internal cardiac defibrillator to help manage a heart arrhythmia, and it has been smooth sailing since then.

"There was no previous history of heart disease in my family," said the retired Maintenance Supervisor from the New Jersey Turnpike Authority. "I did have open-heart surgery in 2000. My

triple bypass at Deborah, to clear blockages, was successful, and I got a clean bill of health


and have taken a stress test every two vears."

"This incident took me completely by surprise. I am so lucky there was no damage to my heart or brain."

Buckley, who is recovering from his procedure, has transferred back to his local cardiologist, Dr. Mahesh Tekriwal, for care. He fully expects to get the green light to resume his full schedule including firefighting - soon. He recently attended a special presentation ceremony at the Barnegat Municipal Building when seven of his firefighting colleagues from Fire Company Station 11 were honored two with CPR Save Award pins, and five with Certificates of Lifesaving.

"I'm ecstatic. I feel great. Everything worked for me."♥



Just the Facts

What you need to know about Deborah Heart and Lung Center

Deborah Heart and Lung Center recently conducted a number of focus groups to find out what people think about our medical facility. Myth #2 – You Must Have a Referral from Your Primary Care Physician to Go to

Fact: A referral is only necessary if your insurance company requires it. While Deborah enjoys working with primary care physicians and has relationships with most cardiologists and other specialists in the region, patients can call Deborah directly to make an appointment if they prefer. Also, the days are long gone when patients at Deborah had to be "sponsored" to come here. Our schedulers look forward to assisting you – just call and make an appointment.

Myth #3 – Deborah is in a Really Difficult Place to Get to

Fact: Quite the opposite. Deborah is actually right in the center of New Jersey and is an easy ride from almost anywhere in Burlington, Ocean, Mercer, Monmouth, Middlesex and Camden Counties. Plus, we have onsite free parking, a spacious, airy, tree-filled campus, on-site rooms for overnight stays, and many other amenities not found at larger hospitals. It could not be easier or more convenient to get Deborah!

From the desk of Steve Toal, Chief Development Officer

In my role as Chief Development Officer, I very often have the pleasure of speaking in front of large groups as well as meeting individually with Deborah patients and donors. Inevitably, the question is asked "Is it true that the care at Deborah is free?" As all those in earshot begin nodding their heads in agreement, I am quick to say, "No, the care at Deborah is NOT free... in fact, it is quite expensive!" This always seems to quiet the room.



For 91 years, Deborah has provided high quality, technologically advanced specialized medical care to all who come here. Our mission has been to provide this care regardless of a patient's ability to pay. Deborah specializes in heart, lung and vascular procedures, while employing the most skilled physicians and the most up-to-date protocols and technology...which are indeed, very expensive.

Although Deborah receives payment from insurance companies, there still is a large amount for which we are not reimbursed. For example, last year Deborah provided \$63,976,692 in services to uninsured and under-insured patients. Although we received a \$6,860,603 subsidy from the State, \$57,116,089 in gross charges remains unpaid! In addition, the fact that we treat so many complex cases and do not balance bill our patients is why we rely so heavily on the generous support of donors (like you) to support this mission through contributions to the Deborah Hospital Foundation.

Out and About with Community Outreach

Helping our Neighbors Affected by Sandy

uperstorm Sandy devastated a huge swath of the Jersey shore. As our neighbors began the difficult task of cleaning up, rebuilding, and returning to everyday life, the medical experts at Deborah expressed concerns about health impacts as a result of the storm.

Many individuals are unknowingly exposed to mold, asbestos and mildew, among other airborne contaminants. Of special concern are: people age 55+ who make up a large portion of the population in Ocean and Monmouth Counties; first responders; volunteers; and contractors who worked side-by-side with homeowners and tenants during the Sandy clean-up. Our Deborah experts have put together a pro-active respiratory and cardiac health screening program to help identify any potential problems from contaminant exposure.

Partnering with local groups whose constituencies include those hardest hit by Sandy, i.e. churches, fire departments, civic organizations, senior citizen groups, as well as the Long Term Recovery Groups (LTRG) of Ocean and Monmouth Counties, Deborah has been able to secure screening sites in the communities hardest hit by Sandy. Here, individuals are seen by Deborah medical experts who provide a free pulmonary and cardiovascular medical screening which includes; pulse oximetry, pulmonary function test, auscultation of the lungs, and blood pressure. When completed, each person is provided with a medical report they can share with their physician if follow-up testing is recommended.


Deborah's commitment to bring its expertise into the community is rooted in the belief that health screenings that are convenient and close to home are the best way Deborah can directly help the victims of Sandy, who have already endured so much. A screening provides peace of mind to those potentially

exposed and can help quide those in need of follow-up care.

Deborah urges anyone affected by Sandy to participate in the Respiratory Evaluation of Sandy Program (RESP). 

IRA owners who have attained age 70½ can make "tax-free charitable distributions" directly from their IRAs. This is the equivalent of an unlimited charitable income tax deduction for up to \$100,000 of the charitable gifts made from IRAs this year.
