Dear Readers,






Deborah Hospital Foundation Receives "Out of This World" Donation from Dr. Greg Olsen - Entrepreneur/Astronaut

s one of only seven private individuals to orbit the Earth on the International Space Station, scientist and entrepreneur Gregory Olsen belongs to a pretty exclusive club. On Tuesday, October 1, 2013, Olsen personally thanked the Deborah Heart and Lung Center for getting him there — even after it appeared that a medical condition would keep him grounded.

Olsen helped dedicate the Pulmonary Rehab Department at Deborah, to be named "The Dr. David Murphy and Greg Olsen PhD Pulmonary Rehabilitation Department." Olsen donated \$250,000 to the Deborah Hospital Foundation because Murphy, the Pulmonary Chair Emeritus, personally supervised the training that enabled Olsen to qualify for the October 2005 space station trip. Tuesday was the eighth anniversary of the launch that started Olsen's 10-day space adventure.

"My family has a history of lung collapses — spontaneous lung collapses," said Olsen, who also had been a heavy smoker. "When my training began in Russia in 2004, they X-rayed me and found a black spot on one of my lungs, and that freaked them out." Although the space station trip was sponsored by Space Adventures, a private firm based in Virginia, the medical experts in Russia had the final say over who would board the spacecraft. After eight attempts to convince the sponsors he could make the trip, Olsen flew Murphy to Moscow in 2005 for a face-to-face conference.

Once he was cleared, Olsen underwent six months of intensive training in Star City outside Moscow, where Soviet and

Russian cosmonauts have been trained since the 1960s. At age 60, Olsen endured grueling physical conditioning, including long sessions in a centrifuge to approximate the physical impact of a rocket launch.

"They have this big room about the size of a basketball arena where they spin you around at different rates to match the launch and the landing," he said.



"Fortunately, I've never been subject to motion sickness." Olsen's flight was launched Oct. 1 from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Kazakhstan. He was the third private individual to take the journey. So far, seven private citizens are among the approximately 500 men and women who have orbited the Earth. "It's a nice fraternity to belong to," Olsen said. "We get together once a year to talk about our experiences. My space capsule is now in the Intrepid museum in New York City, so we once had a get-together there."

Along with the dedication came a piece of ultra-modern pulmonary diagnostic equipment, an endobronchial ultrasound valued at \$250,000. The EBUS (pictured left) combines ultrasound with a bronchoscope, which lets doctors visualize airway walls and adjacent areas, allowing for earlier and more complete diagnoses. In serious illnesses, the EBUS can literally be a lifesaver. It will reduce the need for surgery and CAT scans, and it's considered a huge step forward from needle biopsies. It can also be used to diagnose lung cancer. The dedication of the rehab center memorializes the gift.♥

### New Multi-Disciplinary Oncology Clinic Program Established

eborah Heart and Lung Center recently launched a new Multi-Disciplinary Oncology Clinic Program, under the direction of Andrew Martin, MD, Chair, Pulmonary Medicine at Deborah.

As part of a collaborative relationship with the Rutgers Cancer Institute of New Jersey, the Clinic offers multi-disciplinary, dedicated out-patient clinic times for individualized case management of patients with tumors. An integrated team composed of oncologist Biren Saraiya, MD, Rutgers Cancer Institute of New Jersey; Deborah radiologist Thomas C. Gallagher, DO, pulmonologist Navdeep Brar, MD, surgeon Arthur Ng, MD, pathologist Betsy Schloo, MD, and other ancillary staff work in tandem to provide the most efficient approach to the evaluation of possible lung tumors, and the most effective treatment plan possible.

"This integrated approach offers an opportunity to get the whole patient profile, allowing an efficient approach to the evaluation of possible lung tumors. Many tumors are not cancerous, but for those that are, we want to have as much information as early as possible so a treatment plan can be created," said Martin.

Non-cancerous tumors are closely monitored with careful follow-up. If surgical intervention is required for cancerous tumors, Deborah's skilled surgical staff can move quickly as needed. Radiation and chemotherapy are arranged at facilities near a patient's home, for travel ease and patient convenience.♥

## Hybrid OR Nears Completion

eborah's Hybrid OR is nearing completion. A Hybrid OR combines a state-of-the-art operating room with advanced imaging equipment as would normally be found in a cardiac catheterization laboratory. Here Deborah's skilled Interventional Cardiology Team and Deborah's talented cardiovascular surgeons, under the direction of Lynn McGrath, MD, Deborah's Chair of Surgery, will work side-by-side to perform complex cardiac and vascular procedures like Transcatheter Aortic Valve Replacement (TAVR) and Coronary Bypass Surgery with minimally-invasive techniques. As Burlington County's only licensed cardiac center, and primary cardiac center for Ocean County, the new Hybrid Operating Room will offer patients an excellent alternative when considering surgical options.

# One-on-One with Deborah's Chief Nursing Executive

ince 2009, Rita Zenna, MSA, RN, CPHQ, has served as Vice President, Patient Care Services, steering Deborah's talented nursing staff. *Inside Deborah Magazine* recently sat down with her to see how nursing has changed since her tenure started, what challenges lie ahead, and what are the greatest sources of pride among the diverse group she leads.

#### Q: When you first were named Vice-President, Patient Care Services, what was the nursing climate at Deborah like in 2009?

A: The country was in the midst of a recession, patient volumes at the hospital had declined, we had gone through our first-ever reduction in force, and staff were leaving. My very first agenda item was to stabilize our work force. I spent a tremendous amount of time communicating with the staff, hearing their fears and concerns, and providing them with honest factual information as quickly as I received it. I believe communication is key.

#### Q: What was your next big challenge?

A: The total opposite. Part of the strategic plan included the implementation of the Emergency Department, once that was completed and operational our patient volumes increased rapidly, greater than we had expected. Next we were faced with recruiting new staff and training them to get them up to speed as quickly as possible. Once we were able to accomplish this, and with volumes up, and an amazing relationship with the ED, our nursing staff became greatly re-energized and many of them reaffirmed their personal commitment to Deborah.

#### **Q: You mentioned training. How much training do our nurses receive?**

A: We invest a tremendous amount of time in our nurses' training, although this adds to the initial expense of onboarding new RN's, the outcomes, are part of what sets us apart from our competition. In addition to the initial orientation and education we continue to support our staff throughout their career. Our staff can attend both internal and external education programs and are encouraged to do so. Since the release of the IOM's report in response to the Future of Nursing, tremendous strides have been made to increase the proportion of nurses with a baccalaureate degree from 50 to 80 percent by 2020. We have provided many opportunities for our nurses with our tuition reimbursement program to obtain their goals. With having such an engaged professional staff we are well on our way to meeting or exceeding the 80 percent goal.

#### Q: What about cross-training? For example, Deborah's Hybrid OR will be opening soon. How are the nurses from the cath lab and OR preparing to meet this challenge?

A: We've established precedent for this. Our philosophy is to provide care wherever it is needed; our staff has become accustomed to being able to work throughout the facility. Sure, the nurses prefer their "home unit" but the needs can change rapidly at times, even throughout a shift, and staff is flexible enough to meet those needs. With this culture in place, it has become easier to cross-train our nurses as our procedures and technology blur medical lines. What I have witnessed is that when new chal-



lenges/technology or updated knowledge becomes available our staff will embrace it and often times identify and make valuable comments for improvement.

## **Q:** How does our nursing department compare to those at other hospitals?

A: I am incredibly proud to report that when you look at large, benchmark institutions like the Cleveland Clinic, and they discuss their nursing specific milestones/ outcomes, ours are equal to if not better than most. Our patient empathy, satisfaction and nursing specific quality indicators put us on par with the absolute top hospitals in the country.

#### Q: Why do you think our patient satisfaction scores are so high?

A: Again, I think it refers back to our unwavering philosophy that "the patient comes first". Our mission and goal(s) to provide care to all who need it despite their ability to pay are deeply ingrained and our staff is proud to be a part of that. As new staff comes onboard they are indoctrinated into our philosophy and the legacy continues.

# **Q:** What are the challenges and rewards coming in the future?

**A:** I think as the landscape of healthcare changes, the greatest challenge will be

moving towards a healthcare environment that is really preventative in nature and care that is delivered in an outpatient setting. I believe the only patients that will be treated as inpatients will be those that are extremely critical, emergencies or planned procedures. Nursing will have to adapt to meeting those healthcare needs in different venues. Along



with that challenge is the issue of the ever-shrinking reimbursement revenues, we will need to carefully review how we deliver care and look for ways to stream-


line even further. In addition, we are concerned about a looming nursing shortage. As the economy starts to recover those healthcare providers that have prolonged their retirements are expected to make a mass exodus, all of this is expected to coincide with the onslaught of those newly insured patients arriving at our doorsteps.

The one thing I can say for certain is that if any nursing staff is up for the challenge, it would be the Deborah nursing staff. I am continually amazed at

the strength, courage, knowledge and resilience that our staff bring to the table. They are indeed the best of the best!





## First LARIAT Procedure Performed

Richard Kovach, MD, Deborah's Chair, Interventional Cardiology and Director, Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory, and Jon George, MD, Assistant Director Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory, successfully performed the hospital's first LARIAT procedure.

Performed in patients with atrial fibrillation, this novel procedure offers hope to patients who cannot take blood thinners to reduce the risk of stroke from this irregular heart rhythm. Drs. Kovach and George threaded two magnetic wires to the heart's left atrial appendage. One magnetic wire is advanced to the tip of the appendage from the inside via a trans-septal heart catheterization. A second magnetic wire



is manipulated to the outside tip of the appendage through a catheter inserted

via a puncture through the skin just under the ribs. This wire is advanced into the space around the heart. When the wires get close to each other, their magnetic attraction joins them together. The appendage is then "lassoed" by a loop stitch advanced over the outer wire to the base of the atrial appendage and tightened. This permanently seals off the left atrial appendage and blocks stroke-causing blood clots from traveling to the brain.♥

## Impact of Quadra vs. Standard Bipolar CRT Therapy on HealthCare Utilization

beborah's Clinical Research Department is engaged in a pertinent new study that will analyze the health care economics of approximately 300 heart failure patients who have undergone CRT implantation. It is a single center retrospective study that will compare the health economic factors of the standard CRT (bipolar) system versus the Quadra CRT system with the Quartet Lead to see if there is an advantage to the additional programming choices in

the 4 electrode Quartet lead.

Healthcare utilization information will be collected on both groups which have been implanted between April 1, 2001 and June 30, 2013. All medical records and patient billing will be collected and analyzed including: implant, emergency room visits, all cause hospitalizations, and outpatient procedures to see if there is an overall difference in expenditure of health care dollars.

This study will provide relevant

information on the impact of health care resources used by heart failure patients post CRT implantation.

Deborah is well-suited for study participation. Under the direction of Raffaele Corbisiero, MD, Deborah's Chair, Electrophysiology and Director, Electromechanical Therapy Institute, Deborah has vast experience with both types of CRT devices.♥

## Fully Percutaneous Abdominal Aortic Stent Graft Repair

Richard Kovach, MD (second from left), Jon George, MD (second from right), cardiology fellow Troy Trayer, DO (far left), and vascular surgeon John Cooper, DO (far right), – recently performed a fully percutaneous abdominal aortic stent graft repair on a patient who had previously undergone two failed attempts at other prominent hospitals.

The procedure was successfully performed with conscious sedation and local anesthesia alone, as well as only a small puncture in each groin with no incisions. These types of repairs, now routinely done at Deborah with minimally-invasive techniques, hold great promise for many patients who may otherwise require major surgery for repair of aneurysmal disease.



#### New FDA Device for Clearing Blockages

on George, MD, Assistant Director, Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory and Richard Kovach, MD, Chair, Interventional Cardiology and Director of the Cardiac Catheterization Laboratory are now the first physicians in this area to have performed orbital atherectomy to clear calcified blockages in the coronary arteries. The Diamondback 360®Coronary Orbital Atherectomy System is a newly-approved FDA device for severely calcified coronary lesions, and uses a patented combination of differential sanding and centrifugal force to remove arterial calcium that can otherwise complicate angioplasty and stenting for Coronary Artery Disease. Deborah is the first New Jersey hospital - - and first in the Philadelphia region -to debut this device. Deborah has been performing orbital atherectomy for several years in peripheral arteries, but this is the first time blockages in the heart have been treated using the same technology.♥

## Breathe NIOV in Use for Pulmonary Rehabilitation

bospital in South Jersey to implement the Breathe Non-Invasive Open Ventilation (NIOV™) System in its Pulmonary Rehabilitation



Breathe NIOV System is designed to ventilate

patients with respiratory insufficiency for increased mobility and ambulation.

The NIOV System is a wearable, small, one-pound, battery-powered volume augmentation ventilator delivering both ventilation and supplemental oxygen, which works with a patient's spontaneous breathing via a small, non-invasive open nasal pillows interface. During Pulmonary Rehabilitation, Deborah's therapists, under the direction of John Hill, RRT, Director, Respiratory Services, guide the patient's volume delivery settings and chose from three activity levels.

Research has shown that COPD patients using the Breathe NIOV System experience significant improved performance in the standard six-minute walk test (6MWT) with lower dyspnea scores and reduced work of breathing. The Breathe NIOV System is of particular benefit for South Jersey lung transplant recipients who can now conduct their pre- and post-surgery rehabilitation closer to home, at Deborah.

## Making a Difference, One Step at a Time

arly morning on Saturday, September 21, 2013, the 3rd Annual Deborah Hospital Foundation 5K Run/Walk was held in Medford Township. It included members of Deborah's surrounding communities, local Chapters and employees. This year's event included a 5K run that started prior to the walk.

The 5K route took participants

through the historic town of Medford and looped runners back to Freedom Park where they joined those participating in the walk. At the conclusion of

the 5K Run/Walk, participants enjoyed music, refreshments, and family fun time at the park's playground.

The t-shirts worn by our runners and walkers read "Together, one step at a time, we will make a difference." A true demonstration of this was displayed by the overwhelming support that we received from our local merchants and those who sponsored our runners and walkers.

5K Runs and Walks continue to be popular fundraising events for Deborah. In 2013, two outside organizations held events

My name is Marty Spector, a Member of the Four Seasons at Lakewood Chapter of Deborah Hospital Foundation. I have lovingly turned my


hobby into a fundraiser for Deborah. My hobby is baking bread, and I call my effort "Making Dough into Donations!"

## Out and About with Community Outreach

he Community Outreach Program is wrapping up 2013 with another successful year of providing health screenings for the various communities that we serve. The Outreach Program which began in 2008 continues to be a successful facet of Deborah Heart and Lung Center. Screenings take place at conventions, health fairs, festivals and expos reaching people from Burlington, Mercer, Ocean and Atlantic Counties. Screenings include, blood pressure, pulmonary function testing, body fat analysis, balance, sleep apnea, pulse and pulse oximetry.

In the spring of 2013, the Respiratory Evaluation for Sandy Program (RESP) was initiated. The aim was to screen residents of Ocean and Monmouth counties for possible exposure to mold, asbestos and other irritants due to the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy. To date we participated in 13 events and 885 individuals have been screened. We have found that roughly 15% of those screened, have shown some level of abnormality. Whether or not the abnormality is due to the storm, or an undiagnosed problem, we cannot be sure. The program will continue into 2014 with the next event scheduled for February 8th, at Toms River North High School/Pine Belt Arena from 11:00 – 3:00. **To schedule an appointment contact Michelle King at 1-888-555-1990.** 

Another important focus of the Outreach Program is to provide health education. A speaker can come out to your community, or club and address a number of general or specific heart related topics as well as topics on stroke prevention and awareness, diabetes, sleep disorders and tips on living a healthy lifestyle to name a few.

On February 8, 2014 the Outreach Program will be providing screenings at our annual Deborah's Women's Expo. The first 200 attendees will be able to have their cholesterol and glucose levels checked! The event will be held at the Enterprise Center on the Mount Laurel campus of Burlington County College. Our own Deborah Physicians will be on hand to counsel the attendees on their screening results. Women will be stopping by to receive heart healthy recipes, complimentary massages and various other heart healthy literature.
