If I should start by saying that we, the patients, are the happiest group of stricken men and women it might sound incongruous, but it is nevertheless a fact. And of all the factors which contribute to our peace of mind, to our above-mentioned happiness, there is one of which I would like to tell you:—It is that remarkable atmosphere in which all our fears, doubts and misgivings completely disappear. It is an atmosphere

in which the confidence in our eventual recovery thrives. At no time, and in no way have we ever been made to feel that we are in an "institution," and when at certain intervals members of various committees come through the ward, what a wonderful feeling not to be looked upon as a "case." ## DEBORAH100: THE PROJECT - UPDATE

Aiming to conclude **DEBORAH100:** The **Project** in 2024, these enhancements will consist of a three-story addition to our existing hospital, creating 36 private inpatient suites. With a private suite, we are able to reduce the frequency staff enters the room, thus providing more privacy, limiting interruptions, and reducing the chance of infection. This allows for more intimate conversation between our patients and their loved ones as well as with our clinical staff members. These suites are also better equipped to provide critical care and isolation — capable support for those patients who require this type of care.

As we aspire to improve the patient experience with this project, we are currently in the midst of remodeling three existing patient care units. We are upgrading our cardiac catheterization labs in order to enhance how we diagnose and treat a variety of heart conditions. We are constructing a new pharmacy clean room, providing an updated environment for compounding, packaging, and preparing sterile and medication. And we are enhancing our electrophysiology labs with new robotic technology altering how we monitor and map the electrical systems of the heart.

We also recognize the stress our employees shoulder from providing this level of specialized care, and seek to do what we can to improve their overall wellness. A spacious dedicated respite area for staff with indoor and outdoor covered lounges as well as quiet meditation rooms has been included in the project, providing a quiet, calming place for them to relax and recharge themselves physically, mentally, and emotionally so they can better serve our patients.

"We are excited to begin this new construction. Building towards the future has always been a Deborah underpinning, and with our 100th anniversary this year, it is fitting that we are embarking on a bold new chapter in the Hospital's future."

Foundation. Michael has been a donor and volunteer with Deborah since 1972 serving as a Foundation board member and outside General Counsel for fifty years. He was instrumental in helping implement vital legislative protections that preserve Deborah's ability to not balance bill patients, keeping true to its founding mission "there is no price on life."

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# Unveiling The Mystery Of Albert Einstein's Connection To Deborah

Over the last 100 years, Deborah Heart and Lung Center has attracted a significant amount of attention from famous and historic figures including; first lady Eleanor Roosevelt, President Gerald Ford, inventor Harry Knowles, entrepreneur/astronaut Dr. Greg Olsen, professional baseball player Willie Mays, and actors such as Sophia Loren, Paul Newman, Joe Pesci, Ben Vereen, and Henry Winkler. However, none more well-known or thought provoking than legendary physicist, Albert Einstein.

This photograph, taken in the 1933 of Albert Einstein, presenting a donation to Deborah's founder, Dora Monness Shapiro and her husband Solomon, although an indelible moment in Deborah's history, created a mystery eight decades in the making surrounding the connection between Einstein and Deborah.

According to The American Jewish Year Book (1921 C.E.), Albert Einstein along with his colleague, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, went on a cross country American fundraising tour to identify and encourage other Jews to contribute funds to help build the Rothschild Hadassah University Hospital and Ratnoff Medical Building located on Mt. Scopus in Jerusalem. Archived within Einstein's personal letters he wrote of the difficulty he had in spreading

the word and raising the necessary funds. On November 18, 1926, in a bold and direct manner, Einstein made a public and empowered plea for support:

"To the Jews of America: Do not think of political strife, but remember that the Jewish name must be held high. The huge immigration to Palestine, caused by the economic and political measures of the Polish government, should not be allowed to lead to the distress of all the lining in Palestine, but should be made to strengthen our colonization work there. This lies in your hands. Act accordingly!"

At this point in my investigation, I still had not found a connection between Einstein and Deborah. I began to believe his involvement with Deborah stemmed from a more personal experience.

It turns out, Einstein's second wife, Elsa Einstein, had two daughters, Ilse and Margot, from her first marriage. Einstein was extremely fond of the daughters, but on July 11, 1934, Ilse died from tuberculosis.

The connection between Einstein to tuberculosis was indeed personal, but the connection with Deborah was still unknown. Changing course, I switched my investigation to Mrs. Shapiro in hopes of finding her connection to Einstein.

Sometime between 1926 and 1928 Mrs. Shapiro and Einstein met at a posh fundraising event and, with the support of others, she helped Einstein raise enough funds to construct four of the ten buildings planned at Rothschild Hadassah University Hospital. Mrs. Shapiro's personal donation to the Einstein Institute of Physics at Hebrew University was significant enough to have the entire building named in honor of her and her husband Solomon. On March 11, 1934 Mrs. Shapiro arrived in Jerusalem to attend the dedication ceremony for the philanthropic funds she helped raise.

Deborah is a female name of Hebrew origins that means "bee," and is the name of a prophetess in the Hebrew Bible and Christian Old Testament. Deborah was a poet and a judge, who led a revolt that helped the Israelites win their freedom from the Canaanites.

So to wrap up this investigative story, here is what I learned

- While Einstein's step daughter Ilse was suffering with tuberculosis, Mrs. Shapiro was raising funds and expanding the TB services at Deborah.
- Einstein and Mrs. Shapiro were introduced during his cross country fundraising tour and a friendship flourished between the two icons sharing similar virtues and beliefs.
- He gave generously to Deborah in honor of Ilse and to support Mrs. Shapiro.
- She gave generously to help establish a legacy in Palestine, and to support her friend.

In the end, a personal and philanthropic relationship was formed between Albert Einstein and Dora Monness Shapiro resulting in him financially supporting Deborah Heart and Lung Center.

And that, my friends, is the story behind the photograph.
